Questions for week of December 30

- 1. The flight of fowls is used to describe the defense of Jerusalem by God. In what passage?
- 2. What did the Lord do to make fish thirsty?
- **3.** If fish could speak, what would their declaration be? (Read the context for the answer.)
- **4.** What cunning widow seduced a widower and became pregnant by him? This one's name is also the name of two others, the beautiful sister and the fair daughter of a different man. Find the shared name and the references for all three women.
- **5.** What reader was threatened with being reported to a king for what he had read?
- **6.** How did this man (see question 5) explain the production of the book he had read, in terms of pronunciation and writing?
- 7. What prophet wrote almost the same thing that Peter wrote about the temporary nature of our earthly life?

Answers for week of December 16

1. What is the result of being a "lover" of sleeping? **Answer: Coming to poverty.**

(Prov 20:13) "Love not sleep, lest thou come to poverty; open thine eyes, and thou shalt be satisfied with bread."

(Prov 6:9-11) "How long wilt thou sleep, O sluggard? when wilt thou arise out of thy sleep? {10} Yet a little sleep, a little slumber, a little folding of the hands to sleep: {11} So shall thy poverty come as one that travelleth, and thy want as an armed man."

2. Who was told to go to a city and read God's condemnation of the city, and when the reading is finished, to throw the book from which he read into a great river (with a stone attached to the book).

Answer: Seraiah (see next question for reference)

3. What city's doom was pictured by the action of the man described above?

Answer: Babylon

(Jer 51:59-64) "The word which Jeremiah the prophet commanded Seraiah the son of Neriah, the son of Maaseiah, when he went with Zedekiah the king of Judah into Babylon in the fourth year of his reign. And this Seraiah was a quiet prince. {60} So Jeremiah wrote in a book all the evil that should come upon Babylon, even all these words that are written against Babylon. {61} And Jeremiah said to Seraiah, When thou comest to Babylon, and shalt see, and shalt read all these words; {62} Then shalt thou say, O LORD, thou hast spoken against this place, to cut it off, that none shall remain in it, neither man nor beast, but that it shall be desolate for ever. {63} And it shall be, when thou hast made an end of reading this book, that thou shalt bind a stone to it, and cast it into the midst of Euphrates: {64} And thou shalt say, Thus shall Babylon sink, and shall not rise from the evil that I will bring upon her: and they shall be weary. Thus far are the words of Jeremiah."

4. Introduction. . . (Isa 40:28) "Hast thou not known? hast thou not heard, that the everlasting God, the LORD, the Creator of the ends of the earth, fainteth not, neither is weary? there is no searching of his understanding." According to the scripture above, God does not have the same problem that humans have with becoming tired (weary). But there is a passage that clearly teaches that some things have been said by people that made God "weary". What statement does God get weary of, and what question? Answer: (Mal 2:17) "Ye have wearied the LORD with your words. Yet ve say, Wherein have we wearied him? When ye say, (STATEMENT) Every one that doeth evil is good in the sight of the LORD, and he delighteth in them; (QUESTION) or, Where is the God of judgment?"

It seems that Malachi had to deal with those who tried to convince people that evil is good and that God delights in evildoers. He also was challenged by those who implied that there is no God who will bring men to judgment. We still have many in our world who call evil "good" and think there is no divine judgment for what evil people do.

5. What was the occupation of the men who (by stoning him) seriously injured a man's head for asking them for fruit of the vine?

Answer: Husbandmen (farmers, in this case keepers of vineyards)

(Mark 12:1) And he began to speak unto them by parables. A certain man planted a vineyard, and set an hedge about it, and digged a place for the winefat, and built a tower, and let it out to husbandmen, and went into a far country. 2 And at the season he sent to the

husbandmen a servant, that he might receive from the husbandmen of the fruit of the vineyard. 3 And they caught him, and beat him, and sent him away empty. 4 And again he sent unto them another servant; and at him they cast stones, and wounded him in the head, and sent him away shamefully handled.

6. Who threw something into Jesus' teeth, and what did they throw?

Answer: This happened when Jesus was on the cross. The **WHO**, was they that passed by (39), the chief priests, scribes and elders (41), and the thieves that were crucified with him (44). The **WHAT**, was insults and mocking him. This would be what we call today "throwing it in our face". Wonder if we could keep the attitude he did through all of that?

(Mat 27:38-44) "Then were there two thieves crucified with him, one on the right hand, and another on the left. {39} And they that passed by reviled him, wagging their heads, {40} And saying, Thou that destroyest the temple, and buildest it in three days, save thyself. If thou be the Son of God, come down from the cross. {41} Likewise also the chief priests mocking him, with the scribes and elders, said, {42} He saved others; himself he cannot save. If he be the King of Israel, let him now come down from the cross, and we will believe him. {43} He trusted in God; let him deliver him now, if he will have him: for he said, I am the Son of God. {44} The thieves also, which were crucified with him, cast the same in his teeth."

7. Most uses of the word "craft" refer to the work or skill people use to make a living. For instance, Paul was a craftsman making tents. What use of the word (in the King James Version) uses the word as an evil plot?

Answer: (Mark 14:1) "After two days was the feast of the passover, and of unleavened bread: and the chief priests and the scribes sought how they might **take him by craft**, and put him to death."

Other passages that use the word in a similar way: (Luke 20:20-25) "And they watched him, and sent forth spies, which should feign themselves just men, that they might take hold of his words, that so they might deliver him unto the power and authority of the governor. {21} And they asked him, saying, Master, we know that thou sayest and teaches rightly, neither acceptest thou the person of any, but teachest the way of God truly: {22} Is it lawful for us to give tribute unto Caesar, or no? {23} But **he perceived their craftiness**, and said unto them, Why tempt ye me? {24} Show me a penny. Whose image and superscription hath it? They answered and said, Caesar's. {25} And he said unto them, Render

therefore unto Caesar the things which be Caesar's, and unto God the things which be God's."

(Job 5:12-13) "He disappointed the devices of the crafty, so that their hands cannot perform their enterprise. {13} He taketh the wise in their own craftiness: and the counsel of the froward is carried headlong."

(Job 15:5) "For thy mouth uttereth thine iniquity, and thou choosest the tongue of the crafty."

(Psa 83:3) "They have taken **crafty counsel** against thy people, and consulted against thy hidden ones." (Dan 8:23-25) "And in the latter time of their kingdom, when the transgressors are come to the full, a king of fierce countenance, and understanding dark sentences, shall stand up. {24} And his power shall be mighty, but not by his own power: and he shall destroy wonderfully, and shall prosper, and practice, and shall destroy the mighty and the holy people. {25} And through his policy also **he shall cause craft to prosper in his hand**; and he shall magnify himself in his heart, and by peace shall destroy many: he shall also stand up against the Prince of princes; but he shall be broken without hand."

(1 Cor 3:19) "For the wisdom of this world is foolishness with God. For it is written, **He taketh the wise in their own craftiness**."

(2 Cor 4:2) "But have renounced the hidden things of dishonesty, **not walking in craftiness**, nor handling the word of God deceitfully; but by manifestation of the truth commending ourselves to every man's conscience in the sight of God."

(Eph 4:14) "That we henceforth be no more children, tossed to and fro, and carried about with every wind of doctrine, by the sleight of men, and **cunning craftiness**, whereby they lie in wait to deceive;"

I think this is a "sly remark" indicating that Paul caused them to "trap themselves."

(2 Cor 12:16) "But be it so, I did not burden you: nevertheless, **being crafty**, I caught you with guile."

June Marie (in California) commented: "How can one little word take on such evil meanings, and all this time I thought that it meant some ones handicraft or workmanship like making cabinets. . . . sure is amazing what you can find out when doing these questions."
